What fabulous work our superstar students have shown us this week. Look at those big smiles. Well done Aneesa and Elijah, we are very proud of you!







Key Word Signs

Music

In Music class this year we have been learning songs that get our bodies moving, identifying our body parts through song and using our fine motor and gross motor skills in songs. Our Bubble song is a favourite where students are encouraged to grab, clap, point, flick and blow the bubbles.

Instrument time is a joy for most students who love to hear the sound produced by each instrument. Students start by learning how to 'play' and 'stop' playing instruments, moving onto picture exchange programs for requesting an instrument and swapping instruments around a circle during songs. Listening to the music and verbal instructions from the teacher, using multiple instruments to play during a song and using a set instrument to read and play the notes and rhythm to build up a rhythm with the whole class.

A large focus of our instrument playing time is using Djembe drums to play and make sounds and rhythms. Due to the size of these instruments the students are drawn to them and with a solid hand strike can play the

Bass and Tone strikes well.



















Wonderbox Sensorium Excursion

On Friday 3rd May, C1 and Room 1 attended the Wonderbox Sensorium in the State Theatre. Wonderbox is a multisensory relaxed performance that explores Curiosity, Choice, Wonder and Celebration. NAIDOC Week Art Project

We are excited to be embarking on another wonderful art project with Joy Vallance-Humes of Big Yorgas Art. Joy is an indigenous artist who led us with mark making on our yarning circle in the nature play area. This next project will take place at the end of term 2 in line with NAIDOC celebrations. It will be a wall mural that will lead into the entrance of our administration building. Something that our Creaney ESC students can create for everyone to enjoy each time they walk past it.

We wish to gain your input into which of the three designs (below) we will create. Joy has designed these draft images for us to choose from. Voting slips will be given out to your child to bring home this week, and voting boxes will be available to pop your slips into. The first design is a landscape piece that links to Noongar people to "mission," places where they were taught landscaping styles and we then incorporated these into out our traditional painting to tell stories.



The next two pieces are focusing on our seasons, using traditional symbols to tell a story of rain, wind, water, growth, song lines and community.

Djeran

Djeran is the season from April to May. It is the autumn season, when the cooler weather begins. It is a time of red flowers. Banksias start to display their flowers, ensuring that there are nectar food sources for the many small mammals and birds that rely upon them. Hunting for fish continued, Bulbs and seeds were eaten for food as well as plant life and roots from certain plants. As the nights become colder and damper, traditional shelters are repaired in readiness for winter.
